

Dear Ones.

A few weeks ago, over 30 women of all ages from WCPC joined with women from First Presbyterian Church, Conroe for our annual Women's Retreat. Led by our fabulous speaker, The Rev. Caressa Murray of Covenant Presbyterian in College Station, we were reminded how much women need other women, and how important our "sisters in faith" are for us. We explored famous biblical sisterhoods, Mary and Martha, Ruth and Naomi, the women followers of Jesus. #### **PASTOR'S DISCRETIONARY FUND**



## **Benefits of Nature**

In reviewing Florence Williams' recent book, <u>THE NATURE FIX</u>, Why Nature Makes Us Happier, <u>Healthier</u>, and More Creative, Jason Mark wrote, "Imagine a miracle drug that could ease many of the stresses of modern life — a combination mood enhancer and smart pill that might even encourage the remission of cancer. Now imagine that this cure-all was an old-fashioned folk remedy: Just take a hike in the woods or a walk in the park."

In her book, Ms. Williams describes the findings of researchers working in the field of nature neuroscience. "As little as 15 minutes in the woods has been shown to reduce test subjects' levels of cortisol, the stress hormone. Increase nature exposure to 45 minutes, and most individuals experience improvements in cognitive performance. There are society-scale benefits as well. Researchers in England have shown that access to green spaces reduces income-related mental health disparities.....

Maybe it's the forest smells that turn us on; aerosols present in evergreen forests act as mild sedatives while also stimulating respiration. Perhaps it's the soundscape, since water and, especially, birdsong have been proven to improve mood and alertness. Nature's benefits might be due to something as simple as the fact that natural landscapes are, literally, easy on the eyes. Many of nature's patterns — raindrops hitting a pool of water or the arrangement of leaves — are organized as fractals, and the human retina moves in a fractal pattern while taking in a view. Such congruence creates alpha waves in the brains — the neural resonance of relaxation....

Awe, which many people experience in nature, is, according to one study, associated with increased generosity toward other people. Maybe what we get out of nature is a sense of connection to the larger community of life. I know how that sounds: at best like an aspiration dressed up as a hypothesis, at worst like woolly-headed romanticism. But here's the thing — science is on its way to proving it."

The following article was printed on the front page of Family Promise's Spring 2017 Newsletter and is also on their website. With their permission, we have reprinted it below so that you may have the opportunity to read it. Many of you may recall that Tonya & Ben spent a couple days on the WCPC campus last summer.

# Family Strides: The Success of Tonya



Meet Tonya, mother of two (27 year-old married daughter and 16 year-old son), who moved from the Dallas-Fort Worth area for a new job in Houston. Tonya and her son Ben moved to Houston in the spring of 2016. Once they arrived, the individual she was to lease an apartment from and had already paid her deposit to, did not show up on their move-in day. Tonya had no savings, very little cash, and nowhere to live. She lost her new job. Shock and devastation set in as she and Ben were now facing homelessness in an area unknown to them.

"Everything fell through."

"Getting up every morning and not knowing where we were, that was hard for me. I didn't want to move back to my previous city and face my failures, so I knew I needed help."

Through a referral, Tonya found out about Family Promise and decided she would apply. Her family entered the Family Promise Home-to-Home program in April on

her 46th birthday. "Finding Family Promise has allowed me to hit the reset button in my life. I was able to reevaluate lessons and see the mistakes I had made. I'm so appreciative of the programs and staff that were there to help my family. I was able to plan out my goals, focus on what was important: my son, and create a new pathway to our family's success."

While in Family Promise, Tonya's family was helped with clothing, food, job resources, and financial education along with the essential needs of every family. When her vehicle was unexpectedly repossessed, she was given a donated vehicle to drive that would later be gifted to her family upon completion of the program.

"Family Promise has really given me a fresh start on life. I'm so thankful for the many opportunities given to me and my son. My experience has taught me to value things that are most important; smiling, giving, sharing. I was given the security and support I needed to fulfill my obligations and shown that with the right attitude there is a way to start over and be successful."

This hard-working family has had many accomplishments since completing their stay in Family Promise. Tonya is continuing her education, improving her finances, and plans to open her own staffing franchise in Conroe. Ben continues to play football and receive high grades in his academics.

"Family Promise has shown me how I can be a beacon of hope to myself, my son, and others. I want to continue to be an asset to the community that helped me when my family was in need. Family Promise will always be family to me. I know that if I'm in need of a referral, a place to call, or someone to talk to – they will be there."

# Our Local Beneficiary of 2017 Pentecost Offering

When a child enters the foster care system because his or her home is no longer safe, a judge may appoint a committed volunteer to help them. That volunteer is called a Court Appointed Special Advocate®, or CASA. These volunteers are screened and highly trained and then appointed by judges to represent and advocate for a child's best interests in the child protection system.

**CASA Child Advocates of Montgomery County** provides valuable volunteer advocacy for every abused child in this area. CASA volunteers serve as the "eyes and ears" for the judge in child welfare cases. This includes researching each child's situation and making objective recommendations to help them reclaim their childhoods from abuse and neglect. CASA volunteers are frequently the only stable presence in these children's lives as they navigate the foster care system.

CASA volunteers bring three critical qualities to their work: they focus on one case at a time; they bring a unique perspective to the court case; and their sole objective is representing the best interests of the child. The Gathering Place of The Woodlands at WCPC is a ministry for those who are living with memory loss and the people who love and care for them at home. The Gathering Place seeks to help both the care partner and the caregiver. If you or someone you know are caring for a loved one with Alzheimer's, stroke, Parkinson's, or other dementia, you know that caregivers often find it difficult to do things such as run errands, visit friends, or just have free time alone. The Gathering Place provides the caregiver a few hours of free time or they may choose to participate along with their care partner or they may attend Common Ground, a caregiver support group which meets in the WCPC Parlor from 10:30am to noon.

The Gathering Place provides a time of fun activities and fellowship in a safe, caring environment for the care partner during a time where it may be difficult for a caregiver to find appropriate social activities for their loved one with memory loss. The monthly programs will vary, often featuring a festive theme to help the care partner identify with the current season, event or holiday. In a fun, interactive atmosphere, our volunteers offer music, games, chair exercises, crafts, reminiscing, guest performers, and a light lunch.

A representative from InterFaith CarePartners or our care team helps determine if we can meet the family's need with our program. This is done by arranging for the caregiver and the care partner to attend The Gathering Place together for the first visit. We welcome the opportunity to speak with you. 
Our special treat for May Children's Sunday School is Men's May; this year the Sundays of May 14th & 21st. It is a rest for our regular teachers and an opportunity for


