Dear WCPC family,

Peter Ducker, who was a management consultant for many years, suggested at one point that all the books he had written, all the seminars he had taught, and all the work he did as a business consultant could be summed up with these three questions:

What are you doing that you need to keep doing?

What are you doing that you don't need to do?

What do you need to start doing?

I think those are great questions but not just for businesses or churches (I've asked your officers and the teams of our church to start asking those questions regularly). No, those three questions can also be asked of each of us, especially as it relates to our lives as disci-

ples, followers of Christ. And there is no better time to ask those questions than the first of a new year.

What are you doing in your life as a disciple that you need to keep doing? Certainly, I trust it involves regular worship and fellowship at WCPC. If you are doing that, keep it up. If not, see question 3. What else are you doing in your life as a disciple? Daily devotions? Daily prayer? Participating in a Sunday School class or study group?

I know that if I don't walk at least my 10,000 steps daily something isn't right. I know it. Not only does my Fitbit tell me but I feel it. That's the way it should be in our journey as disciples. We hunger for that time with Scripture, with God in prayer. We hunger for reaching out to others, serving them and being generous with our lives.

Question 2: What are you doing you don't need to do? This is maybe a more difficult question since for most, if not all of us, the things we are doing aren't bad things, just maybe not the best things, the best use of our time.

One of the tools I've used in the past is keeping an hourly log of how I'm spending my time. Try that for a week or two. You might discover for yourself patterns that, again, may not be bad, but maybe there is something else that can fill up that time that will enrich your life.

Finally question 3: What do you need to start doing? Again, if you aren't worshipping regularly with other disciples or if you aren't growing in fellowship with other disciples, that is something to begin. Or it could be service. There are so many needs, not just in the church, but in our community, such as volunteering for Interfaith, Habitat, The Montgomery County Food Bank or The Women's' Shelter.

This is probably the most important thing we can do to grow spiritually, to grow closer to Christ. After all Jesus said he didn't come to be served but to serve. Shouldn't we as well as we follow him?

I'm not suggesting that you will see instant growth. It takes time. In fact often it is so gradual that we don't even notice but others do and looking back we do as well.

Think about January 1, 2019. It's not that far away. What we do now and in the coming days, weeks and months will determine who we will be then.

You never know what a new year will bring. You never know really what each day will bring. But we can be intentional about how we live each day and each year.

Dear Ones,

As I write this letter, I am preparing for the surgery I will be having on Dec. 19. By the time you read this, I hope to be well on my way to recovery. I cannot begin to tell you how much your prayers, encouragement, and offers of help and support have meant to me over the past few days.

Among the many things I wanted to do as I got ready for the surgery, was to update my plans for my memorial service (I still haven't gotten around to a will, yet. Perhaps I will in 2018!). Hopefully, this document is not used for a very long time, but I want the people I love to have a starting place. In it I've made suggestions of my favorite scriptures and hymns that would be appropriate for such an occasion for my family. In reality most of what I have written is

just that, a suggestion. There is one element that is not a suggestion. I am adamant that my memorial service will include a remembrance of baptism. After all, our baptisms are completed in death. I want the people gathered to hear and see and maybe even feel these waters and be reminded of the gracious claim that God has made upon their lives and on mine. I want them to be comforted by these baptismal promises.

This month, on January 7, we celebrate Baptism of the Lord Sunday. It is also the Sunday closest to Epiphany, so I am not sure what our worship plans are this year. However, often on Baptism of the Lord Sunday at WCPC, we remember and reaffirm our baptisms. We hear the words from one of the Gospels about John baptizing Jesus in the Jordan River. We see the Holy Spirit descending like a dove. We hear the voice of God calling from the heavens, "You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased." Whether it is on January 7, or some other Sunday in worship, take a moment and stop at the baptismal font. Touch the water. Hear those ancient words as promise and claim for yourself. "You are my child, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased." This is the love that claims us. This is the love that will not let us go. For that I will always give thanks to God.



The Mission Outreach Team's mission statement reads


























Recycle Christmas Tree Lights for Habitat

The Gathering Place of The Woodlands at WCPC is a ministry for those who are living with memory loss and the people who love and care for them at home. The Gathering Place seeks to help both the care partner and the caregiver. If you or someone you know are caring for a loved one with Alzheimer's, stroke, Parkinson's, or other dementia, you know that caregivers often find it difficult to do things such as run errands, visit friends, or just have free time alone. The Gathering Place provides the caregiver a few hours of free time or they may choose to participate along with their care partner or they may attend Common Ground, a caregiver support group which meets in the WCPC Parlor from 10:30am to noon.

The Gathering Place provides a time of fun activities and fellowship in a safe, caring environment for the care partner during a time where it may be difficult for a caregiver to find appropriate social activities for their loved one with memory loss. The monthly programs will vary, often featuring a festive theme to help the care partner identify with the current season, event or holiday. In a fun, interactive atmosphere, our volunteers offer music, games, chair exercises, crafts, reminiscing, guest performers, and a light lunch.

A representative from InterFaith CarePartners or our care team helps determine if we can meet the family's need with our program. This is done by arranging for the caregiver and the care partner to attend The Gathering Place together for the first visit. We welcome the opportunity to speak with you. For us, it is the beginning of a new level of discipleship, an entry into a world where we unite every time we spend a dollar. It is an opportunity to make a difference in the lives of individuals who have previously had to risk their lives by crossing the border to seek work in an effort to provide for their families. It is also an occasion to be grateful for the resources of the earth and most importantly, for social justice to prevail in our Christian efforts to make this world a better place.

What is just about Just Coffee? It impacts the world, beginning with farmers who use organic means of growing the crops and extending to the churches and other supporters who are committed to the cause of fair and just trade for those farmers who would otherwise be disadvantaged by the large corporations that dominate the industry.
