
Dear Ones,

For over ten years, with few exceptions, I have worn a charm of the seal of the Presbyterian Church (USA) on a daily basis. Honestly, it's gotten to the point where I don't feel fully dressed without it on. I fidget with it when I'm nervous, or lost in thought. I hold on to it when I'm deep in prayer. I've even been known to use it as a tool for explaining why I love the denomination of which I am a member and into which I have been called to serve. It might be a stretch but you could say that it is a part of who I am. Perhaps, more accurately, you could say that it marks me. As silly as it may seem, these last couple months, when I have not been able to wear it, have been a bit of a challenge for how I identify myself. Since Ash Wednesday, I've been thinking about how we mark ourselves, how we set our-

selves apart. If you've ever walked around with a cross of Ash on your forehead, people have some idea that you are Christian, that you observe the season of Lent, etc. It's a very visible sign. I also know that when we baptize, we find ourselves marked, and claimed in a wholly different way. As we prepared for our Lenten journey, we were reminded by the prophets Joel and Isaiah, and also by Jesus, that it is not simply the visible signs of our devotion and practice that God desires from us, but rather our whole hearts and lives. This Lent, how are you marking yourself in devotion to God? Does it matter to you if others can see it? Is it changing you? These are some of the things I have been pondering.





The Gathering Place of The Woodlands at WCPC is a ministry for those who are living with memory loss and the people who love and care for them at home. The Gathering Place seeks to help both the care partner and the caregiver. If you or someone you know are caring for a loved one with Alzheimer's, stroke, Parkinson's, or other dementia, you know that caregivers often find it difficult to do things such as run errands, visit friends, or just have free time alone. The Gathering Place provides the caregiver a few hours of free time or they may choose to participate along with their care partner or they may attend Common Ground, a caregiver support group which meets in the WCPC Parlor from 10:30am to noon.

The Gathering Place provides a time of fun activities and fellowship in a safe, caring environment for the care partner during a time where it may be difficult for a caregiver to find appropriate social activities for their loved one with memory loss. The monthly programs will vary, often featuring a festive theme to help the care partner identify with the current season, event or holiday. In a fun, interactive atmosphere, our volunteers offer music, games, chair exercises, crafts, reminiscing, guest performers, and a light lunch.

A representative from InterFaith CarePartners or our care team helps determine if we can meet the family's need with our program. This is done by arranging for the caregiver and the care partner to attend The Gathering Place together for the first visit. We welcome the opportunity to speak with you. WCPC Capital Campaign Tithe to Peru Mission

10% of WCPC's Capital Campaign is being tithed to mission, with a third of that going to Peru. The Mission Outreach Team (MOT) recently decided to contribute \$4,000 to two mission capital projects in Peru.

Quillabamba

WCPC is contributing \$2,000 in partnership with First Presbyterian Church Bryan to support a building program at the Sajiruyoc Seminary & Retreat Center in Quillabamba. When members of WCPC visited the seminary with other New Covenant Presbytery churches in 2013, classes were held in a three sided shelter in the jungle on the side of a hill. Since then, FPCB has worked with enrolled seminarians, ministers, administrators and church members from throughout the La Convencion Province to complete a chapel, dormitories, showers and toilet facilities, classrooms and a kitchen. This year, they are raising \$10,000 to construct the final building, a multipurpose facility for religious services, graduations, Presbytery gatherings, and retreats.





Sicuani

WCPC is contributing \$2,000 to help the Sicuani Bible Seminary complete construction of a new men's and women's bathroom facility. Construction began in early January by students and the local community during the holiday break. Initial funding was raised by the students and will cover the primary structure and basic plumbing. The funds provided by WCPC will enable the seminary to complete the interior walls and install the plumbing fixtures.





WCPC has the opportunity to join First Presbyterian Church Bryan on a Mission Trip to Quillabamba

First Presbyterian Church Bryan has invited WCPC to join them on their 2018 mission trip to the Sajiruyoc Seminary & Retreat Center in Quillabamba to work with students, ministers, and the local church community on the construction of a multipurpose building for large gatherings. MOT Adds CanCare as a Mission Outreach Partner

CanCare is a network of trained volunteers including cancer survivors, family members of cancer survivors and medical professionals who provide emotional support, information and resources to others facing cancer. It's single focus is to improve the quality of life for cancer patients and their families. All services are free of charge.

CanCare provides support for cancer patients. Cancer survivors of more than 75 different types of cancer volunteer for CanCare and provide free and confidential emotional support and resources to those currently facing a battle with cancer. A patient is matched with a CanCare volunteer based on a variety of criteria including cancer site, treatments, age and gender. Support is provided over the phone, through email and in person, one time or on an ongoing basis. CanCare provides support for family members. If you have a loved one who has been diagnosed with cancer and you need someone to talk to or need practical advice, CanCare can connect you with a family member of a cancer survivor. CanCare provides hospital visitation. CanCare volunteers regularly visit cancer patients in hospitals through their Hospital Visitation Program. Volunteers help patients and their family members feel cared for, by serving as a partner to the medical team and offering emotional support beyond their medical needs.

CanCare was founded in 1990 by Anne Shaw Turnage, a colon cancer survivor, with an anonymous gift and the support of Memorial Drive Presbyterian Church. Since that time more than 300,000 people have received one-on-one support in their fight with cancer. 






March 29th, 7 pm
