

"Every number has a name, every name has a story," shared Jill Carmichael, director of mission at National Community Church, at a recent Healing Our Borders Prayer Vigil.

Each Tuesday for the last 21 and a half years, Frontera de Cristo has helped facilitate the Healing Our Borders Prayer Vigil in which we remember. Last Tuesday was May 10—Mother's Day in Mexico—and Bethany reminded us to continue praying for Carmelo Cruz Marcos's mother who had joined us virtually from Puebla with Carmelo's widow and their three children.

"Carmelo didn't go to rob," she cried out, "he went to work hard for his children so they would have a roof that does not leak. I want justice for my son and I want him brought back to me." Carmelo had been shot and killed by a Border Patrol agent in the rugged and remote Peloncillo Mountains just 30 miles east of Douglas/Agua Prieta. Watch a 2-minute video of our search for the site.

Over the last two months, the Educational Enrichment Ministry has been highlighted in an exhibit of 16 photos at Café Justo y Mas. Sixteen businesses from Agua Prieta sponsored the photographs, which provides not only financial support but also moral support for the ministry. We organized an event for the children and their families, to recognize the good work of Ammi Robles, a young photographer and artist from Agua Prieta, and for the businesses that sponsored this initiative.



Lyssander Sánchez, is one of the children who identifies himself in a photo of the exhibition, like the other children who were captured by the photographic lens and feel important to be seen by the people who visit "Café Justo y Mas."

We are grateful that the Frontera de Cristo Board of Directors gave us the "go ahead" last fall to begin receiving delegations again, and we have put a number of health and safety protocols in place to make this possible during the pandemic. Recently, we hosted the Senior Class from the Menaul School in Albuquerque—a school that includes, as part of their curriculum, a "mission week" for each grade level. And we are looking forward to upcoming visits from churches and seminaries that are committed to broadening their understanding of cultivating relationships across borders. Francisco, the bus driver for the week with Menaul, said: "I do not know much of the world, but the world came to me this week. Each one has left something with me and I hope they take something with them from me." There were 13 different countries represented by Menaul students, from Africa, South America, Europe, Asia, and North America.

Children at the New Hope Community Center (in the Children's **Enrichment** Ministry) enjoyed a visit by a group of international young people from Albuquerque's Menaul School, who happily participated in activities with the children even though the language barrier may have been a challenge. But facial expressions, drawings, or showing an image on a computer facilitated communication and the desire show to representatives of their country of origin, in addition to dancing through an imitation song and writing the word Hope in each of their languages.

We are happy to announce that Bridich Saragos is the new assistant coordinator of the Migrant Resource Center.

The FDC Board in partnership with the Migrant Resource Center created the position to support Coordinator Betto Ramos and the incredibly dedicated volunteer team who have kept the center open a minimum of 17 hours a day and welcomed more than 18,000 men, women and children since January.

Bridich, a seminary graduate and former intern of FDC, is from the state of Chiapas. She is bilingual in Tzeltal and Spanish and has raised our awareness of the need to be especially attentive to persons who do not speak Spanish or for whom Spanish is a second language. Tzeltal is a native language of the Mayan Indians of central Chiapas, in southeastern Mexico.

Bridich Saragos

Bridich reflects on a day not long ago, when she realized the need for this understanding: "They entered the patio of the Migrant Resource Center and did not make eye contact. They were quiet and they separated themselves from the group. Then I heard them talk in a language that brought back memories of home. They spoke Tzeltal—my native language. I remembered how I used to feel so excluded because I did not think I spoke Spanish well and I went over to greet them in my language and in their language. I could see that they became more relaxed as we spoke in our first language. They had not made it to their destination, but now they had a safe space to think about what to do next. I love being able to use my language to help others feel more welcome."

"This is a sign that life is returning," she said, "and that I am living in recovery because when I am on drugs I don't pay them any attention."
